THE FABIAN SOCIETY

The Fabian Society is an independent left-leaning think tank and a democratic membership society with over 6,000 members. We influence political and public thinking and provide a space for broad and open-minded debate. We believe that ideas matter, and that change is possible.

We conduct research and undertake major policy inquiries; we publish insight and opinion; we organise conferences and events; and we facilitate member debate and activism right across the UK.

As a think tank we have a reputation for high-quality, politically salient outputs that have a real impact on political and policy debate.

Our staff team in London, Manchester, and Edinburgh work with leading politicians and policy experts to develop and promote new ideas and to influence the climate of political opinion.

We are affiliated to the Labour Party and work very closely with Labour politicians, as well as influencing debate across the political spectrum.

We are a membership society and our members are at the heart of everything we do. People become Fabians because they agree with our political values and want to support out work, and to access our content and participate in our events and activities.

Our members set the society's direction through our democratic structures and they shape our programme as contributors and volunteers. Each year hundreds of activities are organised by and for our members by autonomous sections of the society – the Young Fabians, the Fabian Women's Network, the Scottish Fabians, the Welsh Fabians – and by Fabian networks and affiliated local Fabian societies.

The Fabian Society is a socialist organisation which aims to promote:

- An accountable, tolerant and active democracy

Fabianism

The Fabian tradition informs how we think and what we do. Our commitment to Fabianism means we support the fight against inequality, the power of collective action and an internationalist outlook. We believe in social progress, evidence, expertise, rationality and long-termism. We advocate gradualist, reformist and democratic means in a journey towards radical ends.

As a society, we celebrate our historic achievements and champion the collectivist institutions built by Fabians. We promote Fabian arguments within politics today and support the political development of people who share our values.

Supporting the Labour party

As a Labour affiliate, we support the party in its efforts to win power across the UK, and to turn political ideas into real improvements in people's lives. Working closely with Fabian MPs and ministers, we act as an independent-minded, critical friend, providing fresh thinking, addressing tough questions facing the party, and presenting viewpoints that can influence the direction it takes

Pluralism and debate

We are a pluralist movement that creates spaces and networks for open debate, to discuss political challenges and advance new thinking. We platform a diversity of opinion, and constructive disagreement is expected and respected. As an organisation we have no collective positions and we do not campaign for particular policies. Everyone who writes or speaks for the Fabians does so in their own name, without committing the society.

Equality and inclusion

We strive to make the British left more diverse, equal and inclusive, and to ensure that the left's ideas can create a more equal and inclusive society. We seek to create equal opportunities for political participation, in our own work and beyond, for people on the left from every background. We seek to platform and support people from communities which are underrepresented in the Fabian Society and public life

1. To support the Labour Government to deliver on their manifesto, and to transform the country for the better

by generating evidenced and implementable policy ideas, and by supporting debate and discussion around policy and politics

2. To support Labour to win again at upcoming elections across the **UK**

3. To help to build a strong, united and diverse Labour movement

Accountability and transparency

The society is committed to accountability, transparency and ethical fundraising. We are led by a democratically elected executive committee consisting of members representing all parts of the society. Elections take place every two years. The executive reports to the society's annual general meeting which takes place in November. The rules and by-laws of the Fabian Society are the society's constitution. Rules are approved by general meetings, by-laws are approved by the executive committee. Autonomous sections of the society and local Fabian societies also have their own constitutions.

The Fabian Society is funded by our members and subscribers; by organisations which award us grants and sponsorships in connection with specific projects; and by sales of publications and event tickets. Our funding relationships are governed by a fundraising policy, approved by our executive committee. In particular, this stipulates that we will not accept funding from companies whose practices are deemed to be unethical; and that we do not carry out lobbying projects.

Independence

The Fabian Society has editorial control over all our publications. Funding partners are invited to comment on draft outputs when they have relevant expertise but are not permitted to determine the contents of what we publish.

The society is entirely independent from the Labour party. Our editorial output is not shaped or controlled by the party in any way

CHAIR'S REPORT

Ilt has been our privilege to serve as chairs of the Fabian Society over the past year. It has been an incredible year for the Fabians, and we are grateful to the hard-working staff team and Fabian members who have contributed.

What a joy to start the year with the election of a Labour Government! We're proud of the role Fabians played, with Fabian members across the country working hard to help deliver a Labour government. We were delighted to see a record number of 141 Fabian MPs elected to parliament, including six MPs from the FWN mentoring scheme.

After many long years in opposition, we have this incredible opportunity to translate Fabian ideas into government policy and make meaningful change for our communities. Indeed, following the election, many of our Fabian EC members were appointed as members of the government, so had to stand down from our executive. Fabians at the heart of government.

Since the government took up office, the Fabian team have been working hard with both politicians and civil servants to help deliver the government's missions. It is a credit to our staff team and members that the Fabian Society continues to be a leading organisation shaping government policy.

We thank our hard-working staff team, whose dedication to Fabianism consistently shines through. The research and editorial teams have been extremely busy, and we're proud of the quality of their outputs.





Nine research reports published on topics as varied as pensioner poverty, fair pay agreements in social care, tackling early years poverty and improving living standards. The society also published pamphlets from external authors, on issues ranging from buses as a driver of growth and gambling-related harms to how the government can halve, then eliminate VAWG.

The events team hosted more than a dozen events and five conferences, including some of our best-attended Labour Party conference programmes.

Our 2024 Labour Party conference programme was the biggest to date. We brought together a stellar line-up of then shadow secretaries of state, ministers, policy experts, and Fabian members exploring ideas and debating policy.

In the Autumn, we said farewell to Andrew Harrop, after 14 years as our general secretary. With exemplary leadership, he steered the society through turbulent times, and when he stepped down, he left a strong organisation and a fantastic legacy.

Luke Raikes (Deputy General Secretary) led the organisation as Interim General Secretary, whilst we undertook a recruitment process. Huge thanks to Luke for acting up into the role.

As 2025 commenced, we welcomed Joe Dromey as our new General Secretary, who began the role the same week as our New Year conference - great way to start! We were delighted to have Joe join us, following his time at Centre London Forward. He brings strong organisational leadership, razor-sharp research skills and excellent political acumen to lead the Fabians day to day and ensure our ongoing saliency with Labour in power nationally.

The New Year conference, held at the Guildhall, provided a thought-provoking start to the year, with an all-star line up, including a key note from our former Vice Chair, now Secretary of State for Health, Wes Streeting MP. We heard from a variety of Ministers, pollsters, experts and journalists about the challenges facing the country and how Fabian ideas could be instrumental in addressing them.

The events team have gone from strength to strength this year, developing the in-person events offer to include Mission Summits. They facilitated three summits, based on the government missions on health, opportunity and housing. We partnered with the TUC, City Lit and RICS, to deliver day-long gatherings hearing from ministers, select committee chairs and other senior politicians. The mission summits facilitated in depth debate and discussion, new connections and collaborations and are a brilliant addition to our membership offer.

We have seen Scottish Fabians excelling and are delighted that a number of our core members have been selected as MSP candidates ahead of the May 2026 Holyrood elections. We are planning our 2025 AGM in Cardiff in conjunction with the Welsh Fabians. Young Fabians have continued to thrive and grow under the exemplary leadership of Francesca Reynolds and Rosie Jackson. Whilst Fabian Women's Network celebrated 20 years of changemaking and policy influencing congratulations. Thank you to all those who give their time to make Young Fabians and Fabian Womens Network such vibrant member-led sections.

The first half of 2025 was a time of adjustment for the Society, still calibrating to the reality of Labour in power and under a new Fabian General Secretary. There were some fundraising and financial challenges, but grasping the nettle and acting swiftly means we finished the financial year on an upward trajectory. As well as Andrew Harrop leaving, Hannah Kunzlik and long-serving Fabian stalwart and editor, Kate Murray moved on: thank you so much for all you brought to the Fabians.

We began the new Fabian year with a bang in July, launching the Housing Centre, with accompanying research and with a full slate of events planned for Labour party conference. Although the path was not always smooth this year, we are delighted at where we finished, under robust, renewed leadership, in good financial shape and accelerating our ideas and influence into the heart of government. Thank you to the paid staff team and to the executive committee members for enabling this.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

As a long-standing Fabian member, it was an honour to take on the role of general secretary in January. I started on the same day Donald Trump took on his new job. Quite a lot has changed since then.

The Fabian Society has a long and proud history. We also have a crucial role to play in shaping the future of the left.

The Fabian Society helped shape Labour's manifesto in opposition. With Labour now back in government – where we belong – our role is different but no less important. We will provide new thinking on how the government can deliver on its missions, and we will seek to ensure that we keep true to our values. We will support debate and discussion on the left, so that Labour can renew in office. And we will support the development of future leaders on the left.

Labour's first year in office has been very challenging. But even a difficult day in government beats any day in opposition. Because it is only with Labour in government that – as a movement – we have the opportunity to change the country and improve peoples' lives.

We produced nine research reports across the year. My predecessor - Andrew Harrop's - report on pension tax relief generated a huge amount of coverage and discussion. The arts and creative industries unit - led by Alison Cole - launched their final report, setting out a compelling manifesto to broaden access to the arts.



Ben Cooper authored highly influential reports on the quality of rented accommodation and on how we can tackle child poverty with public consent. I led a project on how we can give care workers the pay rise they so clearly deserve. Luke Raikes led a major report on living standards, and Sasjkia Otto wrote a fascinating report on pensioner poverty. We developed the Fabian Housing Centre, a major new longterm research programme which will focus on how the government can deliver on its ambitious housing commitments. This marks a conscious shift toward more long-term, programme based work, which will enable us to deliver yet more impact.

We were very sorry to lose Kate Murray our long-standing editorial director - from the team for health related reasons earlier this year. But I'm hugely grateful for Iggy Wood for stepping up to lead our editorial work, ably supported by Miles Wood. We've produced four fantastic Fabian Reviews, on Labour's general election victory, the challenges ahead for the government, the state of the British right, and the turbulent political situation in Europe, as well as four pamphlets.

Our external affairs team – led by Rory O'Brien has done a fantastic job delivering some brilliant events. We delivered a vibrant Labour Party Conference programme in Liverpool. Our New Years Conference brought together over 500 members at Guildhall. And – for the first time in 15 long years - they heard not from shadow cabinet ministers, but from secretaries of state, putting Labour and Fabian values into action. We launched our Mission Summits – a new events programme that brings together policymakers, stakeholders and Fabian members to explore how can deliver on the government's priorities, with two held last year, another since, and more to come.

It has been a challenging year for our finances. The combination of the change in General Secretary, and the disruption cause by the snap election, meant that fundraising in the first half of the year was significantly below target. The team worked hard to recover the position, and we ended the year with a manageable deficit. I'm pleased to say that our finances have continued to improve since, and we are on track for a significant surplus this year. Delivering surpluses this year and the coming years will be vital to ensuring the Fabian Society is financially sustainable and resilient in the face of a turbulent and unpredictable political situation. I'd like to thank the dozens of partners who have supported our work; businesses and unions; trusts and foundations; charities and campaigners.

The Fabian Society helps to develop leaders on the left, and the work of Young Fabians and Fabian Women's Network is crucial to this. After a challenging year, it has been wonderful to see the Young Fabians go from strength to strength.

Francesca Reynolds and Rosannah Jackson have done an outstanding job in getting the Young Fabians up and running again, ably supported by the Exec, and I'm hugely grateful for their work. We celebrated the 20th anniversary of the Fabian Women's Network, with great events at Labour Party Conference and more fantastic work from the mentoring scheme. Massive thanks to Marianna Masters, the FWN exec and to Christine Megson.

I want to thank my predecessor Andrew
Harrop for all he contributed to the Fabian
Society over the last 14 years, and to Luke
Raikes for his work as interim general
secretary. I also want to thank the fantastic
Fabian Society team. It has not been the
easiest of years, with a great deal of
change. But I have hugely valued their
support, and I'm endlessly impressed by their
passion, their talent and their dedication.

Thanks also to our fantastic exec, and to our exceptional chairs over the last year. Sonia did a great job overseeing the recruitment process (I would say that). And Sara has been an endless source of wise advice and steadfast support.

Most of all, I want to thank our 6,000 plus members across the country. We are not just a think tank – we're a membership movement. You provide the ideas that help drive us forward, and you help make all our work possible. Thank you.

YOUNG FABIANS

Constitution, Ideas and **Engagement**

At our 2024 AGM, we passed the new Young Fabians constitution, which is accessible on our website. This gave us a fresh start and allowed us to codify regional and diversity requirements into the Executive, ensuring that every committee which leads the Young Fabians will now fully representative of our members up and down the country.

Building on that momentum, our Anticipations pamphlet has continued as a quarterly publication exploring fresh ideas and international lessons. Our editions have covered the first 200 days of a Labour Government, lessons we can take from around the globe, net zero policies and more.

We also launched a policy pamphlet at Labour Party Conference 2025, A Manifesto for Britain on a Budget.

Growing Our Networks and Membership

Our policy networks have launched this year, delivering high-quality events on issues from healthcare reform to technology and security. Highlights included a landmark discussion with a Ukrainian youth delegation on defence and cyber strategy, and a partnership event with IPPR exploring the future of health policy.

The newly relaunched Book Club has also become a regular space for thoughtful debate and political reflection.





We were also delighted to welcome new members to our Executive Committee, Jake Thomas, Guy Tennant, and Katie Heags, whose expertise and enthusiasm have already enriched our work.

Parliamentarians

We have been delighted to continue the tradition of the Young Fabians having a close relationship with Parliamentarians. We have been privileged to welcome (among others) Catherine West MP, Dawn Butler MP, the Baroness Harriet Harman, Anneliese Dodds MP, Seema Malhotra MP, Jeevun Sandher MP, Liam Byrne MP, Dr Simon Opher MP, Liam Conlon MP, Rachel Taylor MP, Maya Ellis MP, Nadia Whittome MP, Deirdre Costigan MP, Alice McDonald MP, to one or multiple of our events.

Training, Fellowship and Inclusion

Developing the next generation of Labour thinkers and leaders remains central to our mission. Our online training series has provided members with practical skills and insights from experts across policy, government and campaigning.

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We are also running the Policy Fellowship again for 2025/26, after the great success. The 2024/2025 research projects were made available online and covered a wide range of subjects: from sustainable food production in the UK and harnessing green hydrogen in Wales, to university funding and health inequalities in mental illness.

Crucially, we remain committed to ensuring the Young Fabians is an inclusive and welcoming space. Building on the work begun last year, we continue to embed a culture of openness, safety and diversity across our activities and governance.

Looking Ahead

Our term will end shortly, with our AGM and elections this autumn, but the future of the Young Fabians is bright. We will be handing over to the new committee, after over a year and a half serving as the Executive Committee, and we're very excited to see what they get up to.

FABIAN WOMEN'S NETWORK

20 Years of Sisterhood, Solidarity and Service

This year marked the 20th anniversary of the Fabian Women's Network (FWN), founded by Seema Malhotra MP. With over 2,000 members across the UK, FWN continues to be a powerful force for ensuring that diverse women's voices shape politics, public life and policymaking. Our anniversary gathering was a joyful celebration of our journey, featuring inspiring speeches from Dr Sara Hyde, Christine Megson, Seema Malhotra FRSA, Abena Oppong-Asare MP and Anneliese Dodds MP — all reinforcing our ethos of sisterhood, solidarity, and service.

FWN's flagship mentoring programme entered a new phase this year. After 14 years of supporting women to understand political systems, we now focus on enabling them to make change. With a Labour government in place, six former mentees are now MPs, and two are working in No. 10, and two others serve as special advisers to Cabinet members. The door to influencing policy is wide open and Fabian women are walking through it.

We've seen our members at the heart of transformative change. The recent vote to decriminalise women for ending their own pregnancies was a powerful example. Emily Batchelor from the Faculty of Sexual & Reproductive Healthcare has long worked with parliamentarians on this issue.



Georgie Nel, working for Tonia Antoniazzi MP, helped table the amendment. Catherine Fookes addressed Parliament to rally support, while Dr Sonia Adesara spoke to Sky News, urging compassion over prosecution. These women may not know each other but they're united in purpose, and winning change together.

At this year's Labour Party Annual Conference, FWN was publicly thanked for our contribution to the National Policy Forum. Our mentoring scheme continues to demonstrate how women's lived experience is fundamental to good policy. Ellie Reeves MP said: "The Fabian Women's Network remind us that there is a well-established link between women's poverty and child poverty, and both must be addressed in any serious strategy to tackle child poverty." We're proud that FWN Executive Member Dr Liz Hind led on this work. The child poverty strategy is due imminently, and FWN will host online briefings to explore how policy can address women's poverty. All Fabian members are welcome.

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FWN also convened several events this year, including a powerful webinar on SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities). Co-Vice Chair Anya Sizer—herself a parent of a child with complex needs—led the session with characteristic warmth and urgency. With the SEND white paper imminent and parental anxieties rising, Anya brought together a range of voices to explore both the crisis and the opportunity ahead. We heard from Adenike Ojo, playwright of "In Hiding," which explores autism from a global majority perspective; Councillor Amy Allen, who lives with additional needs; and Dorothy, a young adult sharing her lived experience. The session was moving, urgent and emblematic of FWN's approach: never shying away from difficult issues, but facing them head-on, collectively determined to shape a more inclusive future.

FWN remains committed to amplifying women's voices, building solidarity, and shaping a fairer future—for our movement and our country.

SCOTTISH FABIANS

This year the Scottish Fabians welcomed two co-chairs, Cat Headley and Professor Chris Carter.

Professor Chris Carter is the chair of Strategy and Organisation at the University of Edinburgh Business School. He has been a member of the Fabian Society for many years, he serves on Scottish Labour's Economic Advisory Board and has run leadership courses for the Labour MSP group.

Cat is a Partner at Digby Brown LLP and graduated as one of the first cohorts of the Jo Cox Women in Leadership programme. She was a candidate in the Scottish Parliament elections in 2016. She is a regular political analyst and commentator, appearing on broadcast media.

With our new co-chairs in place, we have continued our work of preparing for Holyrood 2026 and what a Labour government would mean for Scotland.

At UK conference we ran two events looking at this electoral challenge. Anas Sarwar was in conversation with Andrew Marr where he set out his vision for Scotland and the battleground for 2026. He spoke about two failed decades under the SNP, where Scotland and Scotland's ambition has been let down. We also held a panel event with MSP Sarah Boyack and newly elected MPs on the lessons learnt from the 2024 General Election campaign.

In February we were delighted to host our new General Secretary at Scottish Labour conference where he met with the MSP group and our new chairs. We hosted a panel conversation with Baroness Margaret Curran, Baroness Wendy Alexander, Martin McCluskey MP, and Michael Shanks MP on Labour first year of government and the transition from campaigning to delivery.

This Summer featured the very first "Scottish" edition of the Fabian Review which looked ahead to 2026 featuring Michael Shanks MP, Roz Foyer, Paul O'Kane MSP, and Pam Duncan-Glancy MSP. Chris Carter joined Anas Sarwar on the campaign trail in Hamilton where Scottish Labour defied the odds and saw off the SNP and Reform. In this interview. Anas expanded on the themes he discussed at conference.

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The Scottish Fabians continue to empower others and help remove the barriers to power. The Veronica McTernan Fund sends two Scottish women on the Fabian Women mentoring programme and we welcomed Cohort 13 of the Fabian Women's Mentoring Programme to the Scottish Parliament. Thank you to Sarah Boyack MSP and Pam Duncan-Glancy MSP for being so generous with their time. This event is now a regular event in the Fabian Women's Mentoring programme. TREASURER'S REPORT

BY PAUL RICHARDS

I am pleased to present my annual report as honorary treasurer of the Fabian Society. As ever, we must all be grateful to the Fabian staff team, and especially Phil Mutero, for all their hard work in maintaining sound finances and generating income. I am pleased that our new General Secretary's first months have been marked by close attention to the Society's financial wellbeing, and the pressing need to attract income from a diversity of sources.

Our greatest strength derives, not only from sponsorship or donations (welcome though these are). Our strength derives from our membership as a socialist society. Here, I must sound an alarm. Our membership figures are not where we would want them to be, and this puts pressure on our income. We cannot rely on a diminishing number of Fabian members to support the high levels of activity and influence. I certainly do not want to see membership fees increase to the point where people chose not to renew their membership.

The answer is of course to recruit new members, and to cajole those who have lapsed to rejoin. I would also like to see a revival of the local societies, where Fabians can enjoy each other's company and engage in our discussions and deliberations without the need to travel too far. I am pleased to see the revival of the Young Fabians as a source of vitality and a pipeline for the next generation of Fabianism. A renaissance of Fabian membership is a necessary task, not only for financial reasons, but also for political ones.



We are living through the most tumultuous times since I joined the Society in the 1980s. So many of the assumptions that underpinned our Fabianism are being challenged, including notions of parliamentary democracy, the nature of work, the role of technology, and how society functions. That means that the Fabian Society, like the party we helped to found, has no automatic right to exist; we are only as good as our ability to navigate the new political topography. The political ferment makes the case even more strongly for building our membership, diversifying our sources of ethical income, spending every penny wisely, and most importantly building strong financial reserves so we can weather whatever storms we face.
